**El temerario y deslenguado Dr. Perujo** Marcelo de León Montañés, 2012-10-30 “Diga su estado de salud. Población desea saber si acepta traslado a Tacuarembó. Dígnese contestar inmediatamente para proceder como corresponde. Hay gran ansiedad .” (Telegrama de Eugenio Ruiz Zorrilla a Carlos Perujo, Maldonado, 18 de julio de 1882. “[El Juez Dr. Perujo] estorba... la marcha regular de la Administración de Justicia, prescindiendo de los legítimos intereses... vinculados a esta emergencia” (Superior Tribunal de Justicia, Montevideo, 24 de agosto de 1882). “Estamos frescos” (El Liberal, Tacuarembó, 27 de julio de 1882). Un traslado de jueces –en teoría, no mucho más que una medida incómoda- causa revuelo entre los vecinos de Maldonado, una serenata fúnebre en Tacuarembó y la exasperación del Poder Judicial en un momento crítico en las relaciones diplomáticas entre Uruguay y España, tensas tras la desaparición de un súbdito español y otros sucesos graves. Esto inicia una historia abundante en episodios y cuadros de la vida a fines del siglo XIX (familia, estudios, sociabilidad, religión, diversiones, costumbres, idiosincrasias, sexualidad, extranjeros, crímenes, salud, etc.), con personajes que el nomenclátor o los libros recuerdan (Magariños Cervantes, Bernardino Olid, Miguel Lapeyre, Luis Beltrán, Escayola y otros), en el entretejido de la trayectoria de un inmigrante español. Carlos Perujo nació en Ezcaray (España) en 1849 y emigró repentinamente a Uruguay en 1874, donde vivió hasta su muerte (San Carlos, 1902). Este libro se ocupa de dos períodos: uno, desde su arribo a Montevideo hasta la mudanza a Tacuarembó (1883) tras ejercer como juez letrado en Maldonado (y Rocha) cuando los magistrados eran celebridades locales y la prensa seguía sus actividades con interés; otro, el de España, que formó la personalidad de un individuo a la vez único y representativo de varios lugares de una época. “No es preciso limitarse a biografiar sólo sujetos que están en la historia oficial y tradicional. Eso sería otra forma de continuar en la historia biográfica la historia de los héroes. Los sujetos ‘normales’ pueden mostrar mucho del contexto cotidiano”.
